Habakkuk (Habaq – embrace. One who embraces.)

Habakkuk the Prophet (1:1; 3:1).

Habakkuk was associated with the temple worship as the book is written 'To the Chirf Musican. With my stringed instruments.' (3:19)

Written as Babylon rose in power over the Assyrians.

Probably written during the reign of King Jehoiakim (609–597 BC).

2 Kings 23:34 – 24:5; Jeremiah 22:17.

Most likely date would therefore be just before the Babylonians invaded Judah in 605 BC.

Date of Habakkuk c. 607 BC

Theme: The just shall live by faith (2:4)

Habbakuk prophesied about 607 BC

The Babylonians invaded Judah during the first year of the reign of Nebucchadnezzar (605BC). 10,000 Jews were taken into captivity.
